




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VEHICLE STANDARDS CONSULTATION

Earlier this year, February 2011, the National Transport Authority revoked the aspect of the previous 'nine-year rule' relating to taxi and hackney licences issued before 1st January 2009 and, at that time, announced its intention to review relevant vehicle standards for SPSVs.

The aspect of the nine-year rule that was revoked related to those renewing their standard taxi and hackney vehicle licence in 2011 who had applied for their first vehicle licence prior to 1st January 2009.



That vehicle standards consultation is now being launched. There are eight issues being considered; the aim of these proposals is to improve the quality of service, comfort and safety of all passengers and drivers. The establishment by Government of the Taxi Regulation Review Steering Group included reference to Vehicle Standards consultation and it has been deemed desirable to align the timescales of both. The result of this consultation will be an important input into the wider Government review.

The purpose of this consultation is to afford the industry, the public and all stakeholders and suppliers an opportunity to put forward views and suggestions, in relation to vehicle standards. The Authority will consider all views expressed through this consultation process prior to formulating and approving any new regulations. The Authority intends that the changes, when implemented, will serve principally to maintain and improve the general quality of SPSVs and raise the overall standards of the whole SPSV fleet. Where applicable the timescales are indicated in the consultation document.

When the consultation process is concluded, the Authority will put in place revised national vehicle standards. It is therefore essential that those parties who will be affected by the changes take part in this consultation and make their views known during the consultation period. When all the submissions have been considered, together with any advice received from the Advisory Committee, and a regulatory impact assessment concluded, the Authority will arrive at its decisions and publish these in the form of new/revised regulations.

It is important to note that this Consultation Paper relates only to vehicle standards. Please complete the online submission form at vehiclestandards.nationaltransport.ie or by post. The response questions are not designed to limit your submission but are simply there to provide a starting point for your thoughts. The deadline for any submission to be considered is 5pm on 5th August 2011

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Grant aid scheme

As part of the Authority's commitment to deliver key objectives set out in the Taxi Regulation Act 2003, for the development of high quality accessible services by SPSV's, an announcement was made to provide a grant aid scheme to support the upgrade of existing wheelchair accessible vehicles and assist new vehicle licence applicants in the provision of further accessible services. Due to the current exchequer budgetary constraints, large scale funding to fully replace the existing wheelchair accessible fleet is unavailable.

Consequently, the Authority intends to revoke the regulations affecting existing vehicle licences which required vehicle upgrades on renewal of licences in 2012 and to offer a limited scheme.


Funding for the grant scheme, which will commence in September 2011, will be set at $\leq 1.5m$ to year end. It is proposed to apply $\leq 1m$ for conversion of qualifying existing wheelchair accessible vehicles (WAV's) and $\leq 0.5m$ for new applicants for WAV licences. In the event of under use of the $\leq 1m$ or $\leq 0.5m$ allocations, the Authority reserves the right to increase or reduce appropriately the initial allocation sums.

The Authority recommends that you undertake the Skills Development Test as this forms part of the criteria for the grant scheme. Furthermore, ensuring that copies of booking records are in order as well as familiarising yourself with the new vehicle wheelchair standards (please see Information Guide G9) will help preparation for the grant scheme. SPSV Skills Development Programme

Free Industry Knowledge tests and complimentary copies of the manual have now ended.

Over 5,000 industry members sat their free Industry Knowledge test between January and May 2011 70% of them passed. Since its introduction in July 2009, a total of 7,316 industry members have passed the Industry Knowledge (as at end May 2011). Adding this to the number of new industry members who have successfully passed the SPSV Entry test, 9,227 industry members are now certified drivers, and are entitled to certified (purple) ID cards. This represents 23% of current industry members. The Industry Knowledge test is now priced at \in 84.70 and the manual costs \in 30.

Industry members are encouraged to sit the Industry Knowledge test and to order their certified cards. These cards advertise to consumers your expertise in the industry, and are part of a wider process aimed at raising industry standards nationwide.

Vehicle licensing service update

The enhancements to the vehicle licensing service, as laid out in the information bulletin sent to licence holders in April, are due to be introduced shortly.

The Authority will publish the release date on its website and in the vehicle licence renewal reminder letters in the coming weeks. Licence holders are advised to check the website prior to booking their renewal appointment.

Documents will continue to be checked at inspection centres until the new service has been introduced.

The new service will involve all documentation being checked at time of booking. This is designed to reduce the number of inspection failures due to incorrect documentation and ensure a more efficient turnaround time at the vehicle licensing centres.

Important note

Please allow sufficient time between your NCT date and making the booking for your licensing inspection. NCT and Revenue data should generally be available for verification within 24 hours. However, this is not guaranteed and licence holders should Licence holders must make their appointment themselves and before phoning to book must ensure that:

- 1 They are tax cleared with Revenue and their tax clearance details are available online.
- 2 They have a valid NCT for their vehicle that was obtained within 90 days of the appointment date.
- 3 They have valid SPSV insurance and can provide the insurance expiry date.
- 4 They can confirm verbally that they have read and accepted the terms and conditions as provided on their renewal reminder letter and as available on the Authority's website.

Area stickers

New regulations state that all taxis and wheelchair accessible taxis must display an area sticker on their roof signs from 1 August 2011. This area sticker must identify the area or areas for which the driver of the vehicle is licensed to stand or ply for hire. These county identifiers have been introduced as a direct response to requests from industry representative groups, and in consultation with the Advisory Council and An Garda Síochána.

The area stickers contain numerous security features and are tamper proof, so counterfeit stickers will be very difficult to manufacture convincingly. The design of the sticker incorporates an intricate pattern of lines and angles and uses different spacing to create complex line patterns which are inherently difficult for a counterfeiter to copy.

Since 4 May 2011, area stickers have been available for all counties, and all taxi and wheelchair accessible taxi drivers can now order a set of area stickers. The National Transport Authority expects an increase in volume of area sticker orders in June and July, so you are advised to place your order in plenty of time, to ensure you receive your area stickers by 1 August.

Ordering your area stickers

You can order your area sticker by going to **www. nationaltransport.ie**, following the link to the Taxi Regulation Directorate section of the website, and by clicking on the link for area roof sign stickers.

Please note that the details entered when placing you order – your name, address, SPSV Driver Licence number and PPS number – must match the file in the National Transport Authority's database. If you experience any issues in this regard, you are advised to telephone our industry information line on 1890 347 347.

You can also order your stickers by telephoning our industry information line. A single pair of area stickers (one for the front and one for the rear of the roof sign) is priced at \in 15 when purchased online, and \in 20 when purchased over the phone. Pairs of stickers for additional areas, when purchased as part of a single order, are available at a special discount price of \notin 4.50.

Drivers licensed for Dublin who have already purchased a sticker and who now wish to order stickers for their secondary areas can also avail of this discount price.






